Wednesday 3rd February 2021 LI: To identify relative clauses beginning with which, where, when, that.

Success Criteria:

- · I understand that the relative clause provides additional information about the subject.
- · I know that a relative clause begins with a relative pronoun.
- · I know that a relative clause is marked off with two commas.
- To identify where relative clauses can be used to combine sentences (e.g. The man walked to the zoo. He was wearing a bowler hat and scarf; becomes: The man, who was wearing a bowler hat and scarf, walked to the zoo.)

We can add extra additional detail about a noun by adding a relative clause to a sentence.

Instead of using two single-clause (simple sentences) to describe something,

e.g. Wolves eat small rodents, medium and very large animals. This can include deer, beavers and bisons.

We can combine the two sentences to make one multi-clause (complex) sentence using subordination with a relative clause.

e.g. Wolves eat small rodents, medium and very large animals, which can include deer, beavers and bisons.

A **relative clause** is connected to the main clause by a **relative pronoun**. We've replaced the pronoun '**This**' in the second sentence with the **relative pronoun** 'which'.

A relative clause always starts with a relative pronoun.

There are 5 relative pronouns: who, whom, whose, which, that

We can also use the relative adverbs which, where, when, why

Can you identify the relative pronouns in these sentences?

- 1. There is a long mating season for the Common Wolf, which can last from January through April.
- 2. The female will remain with her pups on and off for the first three months of life, when she will leave only to get food for herself.
- 3. Wolf pups are fed regurgitated meat by members of the pack, which allows them to get the nutrition they need after they are weaned from their mother's milk.
- 4. The Common Wolf does have problems with humans, who only see them as a menace or as a very dangerous type of animal.
- 5. The pups are allowed to fight for food, which may determine their order in the pack.


Relative clauses can be in the middle of a sentence (embedded) or at the end of a sentence.

The Arctic Wolf, which usually resides in Alaska, has a cloak of white fur.

The Arctic Wolf resides in Alaska, which is one of the coldest environments on our planet.
