

# Please learn these spellings and meanings from the Year 5 and 6 Statutory Word List for a test on Friday 6<sup>th</sup> December

You are expected to know these words before your SATs.

<i>Word</i>	<i>Meaning</i>	<i>Example Sentence</i>
<b>competition</b>	an activity you try to win for a reward	Sofia and Victoria were in the tag rugby competition.
<b>conscience</b>	A conscience is a built-in sense of what's right and what's wrong.	Ms Soar ate the last chocolate and had a guilty conscience.
<b>conscious</b>	An adjective to say you are awake.	If you faint, you are not conscious.
<b>controversy</b>	a strong disagreement	There was a controversy about whether SATs are a good idea or not.
<b>convenience</b>	being useful	We call the shop near our house a convenience store.
<b>correspond</b>	when two things match up to each other	In a code, the numbers correspond with letters in the alphabet.
<b>criticise</b>	to find a fault with something	Mr Chetty had to criticise the children for shouting in class.
<b>curiosity</b>	when you want to learn more about something	When Harry Potter found the diary, curiosity made him want to look inside
<b>definite</b>	certain or sure	I am definite they have done nothing wrong.
<b>desperate</b>	a person who is frightened and in need of help	If you are desperate for food, it means you are starving, possibly about to die.
