<i>Word</i>	<i>Meaning</i>	<i>Example Sentence</i>
<b>prejudice</b>	to have a negative attitude towards someone based on race or ethnicity	The children discussed prejudice during circle time.
<b>privilege</b>	A privilege is a special advantage not enjoyed by everyone.	The prefects had the privilege of wearing a blazer and badge.
<b>profession</b>	Professionals, including doctors, teacher and lawyers, are trained people paid for their work.	Ms Soar joined the profession of teachers because she loves teaching children.
<b>programme</b>	A programme is a plan or a system.	A television programme can educate and entertain viewers.
<b>pronunciation</b>	To say a word in a particular way.	The pronunciation of the word 'book' is different in the north and south of England.
<b>queue</b>	A line of people.	We have to queue up to collect our school lunch.
<b>recognise</b>	To know someone or something because you have seen them or it before.	I recognise my uncle although I don't see him very often.
<b>recommend</b>	To suggest someone or something is suitable for a particular purpose or role.	The teachers recommend the children to be Prefects in Year 6 each year.
<b>relevant</b>	Something that is connected or appropriate to what is being done or considered.	The children found evidence that was relevant to show their answer in reading.
<b>restaurant</b>	A place to sit down and eat.	We chose to eat at The Desert restaurant to celebrate my birthday.
