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Letter from the Director of Waltham Forest Children's Services

Dear Parents/Carers,

I am delighted to present this booklet which has been written to help parents and carers of children with special educational needs. It provides information about the range of provision available in Waltham Forest, and gives contact details of some of the voluntary sector organisations that work with families. Those of you with internet access can also obtain information from the Waltham Forest internet site: www.walthamforest.gov.uk

Every Child Matters: Change for Children is a new approach to ensure the well-being of children and young people from birth to age 19.

The Government's aim is for every child, whatever their background or their circumstances, to have the support they need to:

- be healthy;
- stay safe;
- enjoy and achieve;
- make a positive contribution;
- achieve economic well-being.

This means that the organisations involved with providing services to children - from hospitals and schools, to police and voluntary groups - will be teaming up in new ways, sharing information and working together, to protect children and young people from harm and help them achieve what they want in life. Children and young people will have far more say about issues that affect them as individuals and collectively.

From April 2008 every local authority will be working with its partners, through children's services, to find out what works best for children and young people in its area and planning how to provide the services that best meet the needs. The Children and Young People's Plan gives details of current priorities.

A significant development currently taking place in Waltham Forest is the establishment of a multi-agency children's service. Many services for children and their families that have traditionally been provided by education, social services and health will be coming together into a new single service. Schools will remain self governing bodies, as they are at present.

The Local Authority Children's Service in partnership with schools will continue to develop provision that is well-matched to individual need, and continue to ensure that children with special educational needs are educated in mainstream settings wherever possible, while maintaining special schools for those children with the most complex needs. We aim to work closely with parents in developing plans for children with special educational needs and remain committed to the principal that children and young people should also contribute to these plans wherever possible.

Introduction



The Special Educational Needs graduated approach

Some children find it much harder to learn than other children of the same age. They may need extra help in school or nursery. These children are said to have special educational needs.

It is important to identify these needs as soon as possible. Teachers continually check the progress children are making and will adapt their teaching for children having difficulties.

A very few children will have very severe or complex difficulties which require a detailed multi-disciplinary assessment by the local authority which may lead to a statement of special educational needs. Most children with special educational needs have their needs met in their local school, without the need for a statement.

The Special Educational Needs Code of Practice gives guidance to schools and the local authority on how they should provide help for children. The Department for Children Schools and Families publish a booklet for parents explaining special educational needs called 'Special Educational Needs: a Guide for Parents and Carers'.

How can schools help children with special educational needs?

When a teacher first thinks a child has special educational needs they will look at how they can adapt their teaching and the work they ask the child to do. This is called differentiation.

If they think the child needs support additional to or different from other children in class they will talk to the school's Special Educational Needs Coordinator (SENCo) sometimes known as the Inclusion Coordinator. The SENCo may suggest strategies that the class or subject teacher can use. They may also decide that the child needs some additional support. This is called **School/Early Years Action** and the school/setting will involve you in any decisions that they make about how to help your child make progress and they will review these decisions at least twice a year with you.

Parents will always be told when their child is having special educational provision and you will have a chance to give your views to the school/setting about this.

Each school/setting has a special educational needs policy that explains how they plan support for children with special educational needs.

Usually some extra help within school enables a child to make progress. If it does not the SENCo will ask for advice from outside the school. This may be from an educational psychologist, a speech and language therapist or a specialist teaching service. They will assess the child's difficulties and the way they learn best and provide advice on the extra help the child may need. This is called **School/Early Years Action Plus** and the specialist advice will be reflected in the support your child receives.

Statutory assessment process

If a child has not made progress after at least 2 terms despite the additional help provided by the school and the external support at School/ Early Years Action Plus the school may need to make a referral to the local authority to request a detailed assessment to decide whether a statement is needed. This assessment is called a statutory assessment because the way the assessment is carried out is laid down in the Education Act 1996.

Some children if they have very severe and or complex needs have a statutory assessment before they start school.

When schools request a statutory assessment the local authority will make sure parents have been consulted and that there is sufficient evidence that the child really needs to be assessed in this way.

Parents may ask the local authority to start a statutory assessment and in such cases the Special Educational Needs (SEN) Team will ask the school and other agencies working with the child for information to enable a decision to be made about whether an assessment is necessary. If it is decided not to start a

statutory assessment parents have the right of appeal against that decision to the Special Educational Needs and Disability Tribunal (SENDIST).

If the statutory assessment is agreed we will seek written advice from:

- parents;
- child/young person;
- the school or early years setting the child attends:
- an educational psychologist;
- a paediatrician (doctor);
- social services:
- any other agencies or services who have worked with the child.

We will tell parents the name of the officer who can give them information and help. We do our best to ensure that you have the same named officer during the assessment process.

We have an assessment administrative team and we endeavour to gather all the advice and decide whether or not to issue a statement within the statutory 18 week timescale.

Details of the assessment timescales are explained on page 6.

The statement

If we decide to issue a statement we will first issue a proposed (draft) statement and send you as appendices all the reports gathered as part of the assessment, including your contribution and your child's (where appropriate). The proposed statement will outline your child's special educational needs and specify the provision the school plans to provide. Parents will be offered a meeting with the officer to make comments about the proposed statement. You can also arrange to meet anyone who gave advice for the assessment.

When the proposed statement is sent to you we leave the part that names a school blank. This is to give you the right to express a preference for the school you would like your child to attend. This is usually the school that your child is already attending. We will send the school a copy of the proposed statement and ask for their views.

We consider all the views expressed by parents and professionals and decide whether to make alterations to the proposed statement. We will then issue a final statement which will name the school your child should attend.

Parents may appeal to the Special Educational Needs and Disability Tribunal (SENDIST) if they disagree with Part 2, the description of your child and his/her needs, Part 3, your child's special educational needs and the provision that should be in place to meet them, or Part 4, the name of the school or setting your child should attend, of the statement. Once the statement is finalised you may have a different officer who will be responsible for all children with statements attending the same school that your child attends.

The timings for Statutory Assessment are detailed in the diagram overleaf.

How long will the assessment take?

The Code of Practice for Special Educational Needs says it is in the interests of all concerned that statutory assessments are conducted with reasonable speed so that parents are informed as quickly as possible of the outcome and appropriate alternative arrangements are made.

Considering whether a statutory assessment is necessary: Following a request from either parents or professionals.	6 Weeks
Making the assessment: From the beginning of the assessment to the SEN Inclusion Officer's decision whether to issue a statement.	10 weeks
Drafting the proposed statement or note in lieu: From the SEN Inclusion Officer's decision to make a statement or not.	2 weeks
Finalising the statement From the issue of the proposed statement to the issue of the final copy of the statement.	8 weeks
There are a number of reasons why an assessment may not follow the strict 26-week guide, but even if one part of the assessment is delayed (e.g. collecting reports from other agencies), the remaining parts of the procedure should still comply with the guidelines.	Total = 26

SEN Funding in schools

The money that each school gets for children with special educational needs is divided into three parts:

- 1. Basic school budget this helps pay for the cost of the SENCo and other expenditure such as SEN training.
- 2. Delegated funding this money is worked out according to a formula and is included in the school's additional educational needs budget. It pays for children at early years/school action, early years and school action plus and for children with statements at old levels B D who need some small group and/or individual support.
- 3. Direct statement funding the local authority helps the school to fund the statements of children who have severe and/or complex needs and require a high level of support.

The amount that each school gets as delegated funding is worked out using:

- 1. the results of pupil assessments and tests (foundation stage profile, key stage 1, 2 and 3 standard assessment tests (SATs);
- 2. the number of pupils at the school on early years/school action, early years/school action plus and with statements;
- 3. the number of pupils at the school who move in and out in a year;
- 4. the progress that pupils make while at the school.

Schools receive the money as one payment each year and are expected to use this money to meet the needs of all the pupils with SEN. This helps them to plan for the whole year.

If your child has special educational needs the school will meet with you and tell you how they will meet his/her needs and agree some targets with you. The support that you child needs will increase or decrease according to the progress that he/she makes in meeting the identified targets.

Choosing a school

We try to ensure that as many children as possible to go to their local mainstream school. It is important that children are educated within their local community, although not all children's needs will be met within a mainstream setting. This is why there are special schools that cater for more complex and severe needs.

When you ask us to name a school in your child's statement, we aim to name a local school as most children's needs can be met at any of the local authority mainstream schools. If your child's needs are more complex or severe, it may still be possible for them to attend a mainstream school or alternatively all Waltham Forest special schools have good facilities to match children's needs within the local authority.

Some pupils who attend a special school have the opportunity to either integrate into a mainstream school or have experience of attending a mainstream for some of the week. Each special school organises their own integration programmes or links for the pupils attending their school. We aim to increase the numbers of pupils who are given this opportunity.

Disability discrimination

Schools must not treat any child less favourably because they have a disability (including a learning disability). They must take reasonable steps to change things so that a child with a disability is not disadvantaged when compared to other children.

The Disability Discrimination Act requires schools and local authorities to plan to improve access to mainstream education and the curriculum.

The laws in respect of disability discrimination and special educational needs are different. Not every child with a special educational need will have a disability. If you feel that your child has a disability and has been discriminated against you can appeal to the Special Educational Needs and Disability Tribunal (SENDIST).

Parent Partnership Service

This is an impartial service which provides information and support to parents or cares of children with special educational needs, whether it is through the statutory assessment process or for children who already have a statement. They can also support parents if the local authority has decided not to proceed with a statutory assessment, or if parents have general concerns around their child's progress

The support can be in the form of telephone contact, accompanying parents to meetings, support with preparing parents' views in writing or a combination of all these. Parent Partnership also sends out a regular newsletter and provides training and forums for parents on issues that affect pupils with special educational needs.

Disagreement resolution

If you disagree with any decision made relating to the statement or the local authority's decision not to assess your child, you can contact the local disagreement resolution service. The local authority will always try and work with you to try and resolve any disagreement you have. If you ask for independent mediation, this does not affect your right to appeal to the SEN & Disability Tribunal and your appeal can run alongside any mediation.

The Specialist Children's Services provides a multi-disciplinary service to disabled children, children with health needs, their parents and carers. The local authority (education and social care) and Waltham Forest Primary Care Trust have worked together to develop an integrated service offering greater co-ordination in the way that professionals work together with families to support children.

Most of these teams are now based at The Wood Street Health Centre, but some staff may be based at other locations.

The Specialist Children's Services brings together various teams:

Child Health Team

The Child Health Team is responsible for recording information on the child health computer system for all children for whom Waltham Forest Primary Care Trust (PCT) is responsible. This includes children from birth to sixteen years of age (children with special needs to the age of 19).

Child Development Team

The Child Development Team has been set up for the diagnosis, assessment and ongoing management of any children who may have disabilities or developmental problems. It offers a multi-disciplinary assessment of children, with actual or potential developmental difficulties, to determine the nature and extent of a child's problems. The team then draft a care plan.

This is an early intervention programme where the child development team refers parents of children newly diagnosed with autism, aiming to develop an understanding of autism. This programme, devised by the National Autistic Society helps the parents of these children to understand autism and manage their children with greater confidence.

Early Support Programme

Early Support is a government programme to improve services to disabled children and their families. Disabled children and their families come into contact with a wide range of professionals. Early Support uses a 'team around the child' approach, with a single, multi-disciplinary assessment and identified key worker for each family.

Community Paediatrician

Community paediatricians provide an out-patient based service to children resident in Waltham Forest, as well as those attending Waltham Forest special schools. Paediatricians contribute to the multidisciplinary service at Wood Street Health Centre.

Speech and Language Therapy Team

The speech and language therapy team work with children with communication difficulties from a wide range of different causes. These may include language difficulties, voice problem dysfluency / stammering, and eating and drinking problems. After assessment and diagnosis, the therapist decides upon a treatment programme to maximise communication skills.

Occupational therapists help children and their families improve their ability to complete everyday activities independently. Children are referred who have difficulty managing activities such as washing, dressing, feeding themselves, getting around their home or using home and/or school facilities. An occupational therapist can treat the child and provide equipment and home adaptations.

Children's community physiotherapy team provides physiotherapy and/or orthotic assessment, advice and input to children and young adults up to 19 years of age, who have difficulties or conditions which affect their movement, development and function. The children's community physiotherapy team works in special schools, mainstream schools, and in the community.

The children community nursing team and special school nurses provide nursing support and advice to children and families living in Waltham Forest.

The service works with families of early years children who have been identified as having special educational needs. Portage home visitors work in partnership with parents helping them teach their children new and useful skills. Specialist provision for early years children

Nursery schools

Many infant and primary schools (and some special schools) in Waltham Forest have nursery provision. Children who live in the area of a mainstream school may be admitted on a part time basis after their third birthday,

as long as demand from older eligible children has already been met.

The maintained nursery schools are listed together with the primary and secondary schools on pages 17 to 22.



Waltham Forest Early Years Service

Early years children may receive education in a variety of settings: pre-schools or day nurseries in the private and voluntary sector.

All of these centres are registered with OFSTED (Office for Standards in Education) and the majority are members of the Waltham Forest Early Years Service. The team works with settings to provide training and support in the delivery of the early years foundation curriculum.

The service has SENCos (Special Educational Needs Coordinators) who coordinate and develop the support for children with special educational needs.

Good Beginnings

'Good Beginnings' is a new programme for parents of young children with speech, language and social, communication difficulties who are waiting assessment through the child development team. Specialist support for mainstream and special schools

Educational Psychology and Behaviour Support Service

Educational psychologists provide a supportive and advisory service to parents, mainstream schools, special schools and other agencies within the local authority. They also play a major role in the statutory assessment of children's special educational needs in accordance with the Eduction Act 1996 and the DCSF's "SEN Code of Practice".

Each psychologist is responsible for a distinct geographical group of schools, offering regular visits in order to provide advice, consultations, in-service training for teachers and other professional staff, discussion groups, as well as working more directly with individual pupils and families, carrying out assessments and casework as needed.

Speech Language and Communication Provision

This is an educational provision intended to support mainstream primary schools to effectively include children with speech, language and communication difficulties.

Referrals are made by an educational psychologist in consultation with the school SENCo, speech and

language therapist, class teacher and parents/ carers. Children are seen in school by the head of the language provision to determine which group would be appropriate. Children do not need a statement of special educational needs to attend but many do have one.

An outreach provision is for provided for children who cannot attend a language group at the Summerfield Centre but still require specialist intervention.

The aim of the service is to provide specialist consultancy, training and practical support for staff in mainstream schools, to enable them to provide a good education for their pupils with communication and interaction difficulties and those with learning difficulties and developmental delay.

The service is open to all schools in Waltham Forest. Referrals are made by the school SENCo or head teacher. An appointment is then arranged to meet with the classroom staff and/or SENCo and observe the pupil. Following this, practical strategies and

support for staff are given. Written reports are submitted following this and further visits made to the school as necessary.

The service also offers training in school on a variety of topics related to communication and interaction and learning difficulties. In addition, staff from mainstream schools are able to visit Whitefield to observe the practice there.

The outreach project is staffed by teachers at Whitefield School, all of whom have practical teaching experience working with children with communication and interaction difficulties or learning difficulties and developmental delay.

The service consists of a team of specialist teachers who work with and offer educational advice to children with visual impairment, their parents or carers and other professionals. It is available for all children from newborn to young people in further education.

A mobility officer provides mobility training and assists in developing independence and self-help skills. Sighted guide training can also be given to parents/carers and other professionals. An IT consultant assesses the pupils' IT abilities and needs and recommends specific equipment and resources to assist in their access to the curriculum.

Teachers also make home visits in order to work with parents/carers on programmes specifically designed to stimulate and enhance their child's use of vision. Parents and other professionals are welcome to refer directly to this service.

Service for Hearing Impaired Pupils

The service aim is to provide access to education for deaf children in the local authority whether in deaf provision or a mainstream school. It supports children from birth or diagnosis, through pre-school and school, to school-leaving age. It also monitors the use and maintenance of hearing aids and radio aids, provides training and guidance for mainstream teachers and attend annual reviews.

Support is provided by teachers of the deaf, communicators and teaching assistants with knowledge

of sign language. The team is experienced in all types and aspects of deafness. "Get together" days are organised by the team to provide social interaction for the children.

It works in close collaboration with the family, teachers, speech and language therapist, audiologists, the early years centre at E17, social services, educational psychology service, Great Ormond Street Hospital, and the Cochlear Implant Teams at Nottingham Hospital and The Royal National Throat, Nose and Ear Hospital in London.

Referrals are made in various ways:

- When deafness is diagnosed in infancy via the clinic
- When a child moves into the local authority
- When a teacher suspects a child has a hearing loss

The service provides:

- two Provisions at designated Primary Schools Cann Hall and Whitehall
- one provision at Heathcote School
- support to schools in Waltham Forest

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Education welfare officers (EWOs) aim to deliver a high quality and efficient service to all schools, children, parents and carers in Waltham Forest in order to promote good school attendance and

to assist, support and increase
the children's potential
through both gaining and
maintaining access
to education.

EWOs work directly with parents/carers and children via home visits and /or meetings in school following a referral. They also have regular consultation with headteachers and other school staff in respect of attendance and child protection/welfare matters either in person or by other means of communication.

Referrals are made by schools and other agencies.

Parents can also make a referral through the school or contact the Education Welfare

Service direct, if they have concerns about their child's education.

Behaviour Support Service (BSS)

The Behaviour Support Service (BSS) advises and supports schools in meeting the needs of children with social, emotional and behavioural difficulties. The key emphasis is to ensure that wherever possible, children with challenging behaviour are supported to remain within a mainstream setting. The BSS includes two behaviour support teachers, a family case worker, behaviour support advisers and a home to school support worker.

Other elements of the service include:

- training for support staff including learning support assistants and midday assistants
- professional development for staff across a range of topics relating to pupils with emotional and behavioural difficulties, effective behaviour management and the development of pro-social skills;
- support and advice for parents of pupils with emotional and behavioural difficulties.

In some instances, Brookfield House also provides a short-term placement for pupils from other schools whilst they are recovering from major surgery and/or hospitalisation. A small number of pupils attending the school have very serious and life threatening conditions. All pupils have a statement of special educational needs, or are in the process of having a statement completed.

The school has recently been refurbished to enhance the facilities for pupils and staff. Specialist resources and facilities include the, medical and health services, speech and language therapy, physiotherapy and occupational therapy, a hydrotherapy pool and sports hall.

The school caters for pupils between the age of 11 to 16 who are experiencing a range of emotional, social and behavioural difficulties. The school has recently been built and offers a range of facilities for pupils. The environment is bright, with an ethos conducive to learning. Pupils are offered a full time table of small group work with specialist teachers, learning mentors and support assistants.

The emphasis of the school's work is on teaching and learning and on teaching skills to enable positive changes in behaviour. It provides close home school liaison because it is important that pupils receive a consistent approach to managing behaviour.

The school aims to promote a positive image which reflects the ethos of all its work. There is currently a Pupil Referral Unit attached to the school for mainstream pupils who have been permanently excluded. The aim of the PRU is to support pupils manage their behaviour.

Joseph Clarke School is a maintained, special school providing facilities for pupils aged 3 to 19 with visual impairment, and an increasing number of these pupils have additional needs, physical and/or learning difficulties.

Almost all pupils work within the National Curriculum at levels appropriate to their individual needs and abilities. Independence skills and mobility training are taught as additional curricula and much emphasis is laid on I.C.T, in order to prepare the pupils for the world of work. There are small teaching groups, a good pupil/staff ratio and facilities for younger and older groups of children with additional needs. The school maintains links with local mainstream schools and pupils are offered the opportunity to visit regularly.

Pupils aged 16 or over are able to follow the ASDAN Towards Independence Course at Joseph Clarke. ASDAN offers a framework of activities and modules through which personal, social and independence skills can be developed and accredited.

The school also caters for a small number of pupils with profound and multiple learning difficulties and complex needs. All resources are modified to meet the pupils' needs and interests. The pupils have numerous opportunities to work in a variety of situations, on a one-to-one basis with an adult, in small groups and in whole class activities.

Pupils have the opportunity to participate in swimming lessons, horse riding and outings to develop their social skills.

Whitefield caters for pupils from 3 to 19 with a range of special educational needs including autistic spectrum disorders, language impairment and disorders, hearing impairment, deaf blind, Downs syndrome, cerebral palsy, profound and multiple learning difficulties, moderate and severe learning difficulties.

Whitefield offers 300 places for pupils with special educational needs. Provision is divided into three specialised schools, each with a head of school. These are the School for Sensory and Impairment and Learning Difficulties (SILD); the School for Communication and Interaction Primary (CIP) and School for Communication and Interaction Secondary (CIS).

The school follows formal, pre-formal and semi-formal curriculums, based on both

the National and Pre-National Curriculum, depending on the ability levels of the pupil. Pupils' achievements are accredited through nationally recognised awards, including SATs, ASDAN, OCR Entry Level and GCSE.

Specialist resources and facilities include the family support team, medical and health services, music therapy department, speech and language therapy, physiotherapy, soft play area, sensory rooms, adventure playground, hydrotherapy pool and sports hall.

Home school links are built up and family support is distributed throughout the schools to cater to the differing needs of individual pupils and their families.

Staff have a range of skills and experience using a variety of learning styles and teaching approaches throughout the schools including, BSL, sign bilingualism, sing-along, PECS, TEACCH, intensive interaction, phonological awareness training, social stories and the use of a total communication approach.

The Learning Support Centre is the Pupil Referral unit for primary aged children at risk of permanent exclusion. Headteachers refer children through the Social Inclusion team. Children receive a broad and balanced curriculum at the unit alongside intensive social skills training. When a child is placed at the

unit he/she attends full time for two terms. A review is then held to discuss progress and set a reintegration programme back into the child's school.

The child has a planned reintegration with support from the unit initially. When appropriate, the unit support is withdrawn as the child's time back in school increases. When all support necessary for the individual child is in place and the placement is proving successful, the child will return full time to the mainstream school.




